It is hard to put the Twenty Summers experience into words. One thing I do know is that when I am at a Twenty Summers event, I often feel like I am transcending time in a magical space.

That magical space is the historic Hawthorne Barn. Nestled in the sand dunes of Provincetown, the Barn began as a studio for Charles Hawthorne, was the birthplace for the Cape Cod School of Art at the turn of the 20th century, and is now our seasonal home. Twenty Summers exists to pay homage to and build on this extraordinary artistic legacy, an essential part of Provincetown's history as the longest-running continuous artist community in the U.S.

Each season, we invite some of the most compelling artists and creative thinkers of our time to read, think, perform, and interact with our local community. Twenty Summers' contribution to the cultural landscape of Provincetown is significant, and one that leaves an imprint year-round.

Last year Twenty Summers celebrated its tenth season, making 2023 an exceptional year for us. We welcomed seven artists from diverse backgrounds and disciplines to participate in our residency program and presented a record-breaking twenty-five cultural events. The eclectic line-up of engaging artist talks, poetry readings, film screenings, and performances brought us the sultry vocals of Kat Wright, an in-person conversation with feminist icon and author Margaret Atwood, a live

podcast hosted by Truth Bachman, a panel on Community, Climate, and Queers, and so much more.

We also had a leadership change at the helm. Aziz Isham, who joined us as Executive Director back in 2020, moved on to an exciting opportunity at the Museum of the Moving Image. We are so grateful for Aziz's guidance and vision. Quite simply, he transformed our organization from a small, fledgling arts organization to an arts institution with a national profile, strong financials, and a committed base of supporters. His impact will be felt for a long time. And with the steady stewardship of Alice Gong, our Program Director, who stepped up as Interim Executive Director, we welcomed Bill Reihl as our new Executive Director in January 2024.

Finally, we saw the steady growth in our philanthropic support. We are so grateful for the support of so many generous individuals, foundations, and government agencies who care about Twenty Summers and the art and artists we support and feature in our programming.

I have no doubt that the future of Twenty Summers is exciting and bright. We look forward to building on the legacy of the Hawthorne Barn as an epicenter of artistic growth and exploration in

Provincetown. Thank you for being part of our extraordinary journey.

The organization was founded in Provincetown's historic Hawthorne Barn, and we honor its legacy of artistic freedom by providing resources, residencies, and a platform for original projects and innovative ideas.

We believe that, in the right context, creative minds can find solutions to our hardest problems.





2023 Fellowships

In 2023, Twenty Summers was proud to welcome seven diverse artists to Provincetown to participate in our signature residency program. In planning this season, we made an intentional decision to build our first cohort of artists to represent the broad range of the AAPI diaspora: Vietnamese-American songwriter and scholar Dr. Julian Saporiti (aka "No-No Boy"), whose immersive multimedia work blends in service of illuminating hidden American histories; Kit Zauhar, a Chinese-American writer, director, and actress whose films Actual People and This Closeness have garnered international acclaim; and self-taught culinary artist Jon Kung, who creates cuisine he truly sees as Chinese American.

Our second cohort of residents included Ruth Ozeki, a novelist, filmmaker, and Zen Buddhist priest, whose books are recognized at a global scale; Kate Rich, a trade artist and feral economist exploring our consumption and the impact it has on the world; Antoinette Cooper, a writer, rainmaker, and TEDx speaker committed to the liberation of Black bodies through the arts, ancestral healing, social justice, and medical humanities; and local artist Alejandra Cuadra, whose work embraces clay, wood, mixed media, and her proud Latina sensibility.





A Look Back at Season Ten

Twenty Summers celebrated its tenth season with an arts festival featuring the most robust line-up in the organization's history, with more than two dozen publicly accessible cultural events that paid tribute to the artistic legacy of Provincetown. We kicked off the season with an opening party in partnership with the Crown & Anchor, followed by an immersive multimedia performance by No-No Boy.

Partnering with Provincetown Film Society, we screened the poignant film Actual People, with a conversation led by filmmaker Kit Zauhar, and Beyond the Screen: A Celebration of Films that Break the Fourth Wall, curated by award-winning documentary filmmaker and past Twenty Summers resident Shaina Feinberg. Truth Future Bachman, the "rising-star nonbinary composer" (Playbill), vocalist, and writer of socially focused musicals, presented FARMED x PTOWN, an unforgettable concert with an earth-shattering choir of voices and interview series inspired by George Orwell's Animal Farm. We hosted conversations about The Death and Life of Local Journalism with the founders of the Provincetown Independent; learned about the global climate impact of fires at World on Fire: Woodwell Climate Research Panel; and explored housing issues at Twenty Summers from Today, Climate, Community & Queer Futures.



We hosted Art in the Barn, a perennial favorite, in collaboration with PAAM: three full days of study and painting in the style of Charles Hawthorne, led by local artist John Clayton.

Other memorable Season 10 highlights include transdisciplinary artist Gin Stone inviting the public to experience a new site-specific installation at the Hawthorne Barn; Provincetown's own comic improv darling Saltine + Sullivan present: Eggs Isle; live concerts featuring the Maine-based indie duo Oshima Brothers, Chilean singer-songwriter Pascuala Ilabaca y Fauna, and Kat Wight, whose sultry and dynamic, delicate yet powerful voice brought the house down. This powerful season also included a discussion of Horse Barbie: A Memoir, by Geena Rocero, an award-winning producer,

director, model, public speaker, trans rights advocate, and television host; and the wonderful end-of-season finale—a public event with Pulitzer prize—winning novelist Margaret Atwood, in conversation with feminist author Vivian Gornick. While our public season ended with Atwood's event, we had a hugely successful fundraiser to finish off Season 10 in which Julian Zelizer, author and political history professor at Princeton, sat down with musician Rosanne Cash to discuss the evolution of music and politics, from her dad's inspiration during her childhood to her own rise as a folk artist.


